

The Ebby House Transformation

We often say that Juliette Fowler has evolved to meet changing needs. One example is the various transformations seen by the oldest building on Fowler property. Dedicated on February 24, 1957, the building originally served as a Staff Residence. According to the Dedication Program from that day, the Staff Residence was needed "to house the additional nurses and other staff members whose job requires that they live at the Home."


Over time, staff was no longer required to live at Fowler and the versatile building transitioned from Staff Residence, to Administration Offices, to Partners Building and storage for discarded furniture, historical files, and computer equipment. This year, new life was breathed into the building and it was brilliantly transformed by a talented group of interior designers, contractors, volunteers and donors. On May 21, 2014 the building was re-dedicated as "The Ebby House." Named for real estate legend

Ebby Halliday Acers, Fowler's 2013 Visionary Woman,

the Ebby House will be home to a new residential program for young women who have aged out of foster care.

Almost two years in the planning, The Ebby House has been a labor of love for visionary CEO Sabrina Porter.

Her enthusiasm was contagious as others, including



her husband Joel, joined her to find an affordable way to transform an old house with "good bones" and create a welcoming environment that was inspiring and empowering. (Continued on page 6)



artwork, and new bathroom vanities. In year two, they ensured the safety of the new inhabitants by funding the much needed fire alarm system. They also furnished the upstairs den that is ideal for watching TV, reading and relaxing. Named "The Dallas Junior Forum Residences," the dormitory-style second floor will be home to up to 16 young

women and their live-in house manager. The women of Dallas Junior Forum not only funded the redecorating, but turned out en-masse for "Volunteer Paint Days" and "Decorate the

Space Day." Fowler also partnered with non-profit DWELL WITH DIGNITY to design the first floor shared living space, dining area and foyer. With the labor of creative volunteers and the generosity of dedicated donors such as Comerica Bank, the spaces became both functional and inspiring. The rooms feature comfortable seating, inspiring art, bright fabrics and lighting. Special custom touches include a chalkboard chore chart and the hand-painted mural with the inscription

"Girls With Dreams Become Women With Vision."

Contractor David Oliver of Olicon, Inc. rallied his vendors to join the project. New carpet, durable wood laminate flooring, and fresh



paint are found throughout the house. Windows have been repaired and sparkle. Updated cabinets, counters, appliances and pendant lighting complete the residential kitchen, which is both functional and educational, as the residents will learn to budget, plan and cook their meals.



The Ebby House is poised to open this fall. There are still projects that remain. An ADA bedroom and bathroom must be added so that a young woman with disabilities can be served. The Computer Center still needs computers, printers and a projector. Space for laundry rooms, both upstairs and downstairs, have been designated for future enhancements.
